Grooming of a Matriarch, Rose Janelle, our post master, community servant, social worker, artist, and C. of C. has seen it all. Following high school she was a heraldry painter (Queen Elizabeth has two pieces of her work). For the next 8 years she trucked, worked in gas stations, gift shops, and homesteaded. In 1983 she and her husband, Mike Jay, visited Ted Austin in Grappler where they painted on and off over 3 years. "Bamfield was the first place I'd been where you could really breathe." Her first job in Bamfield was harvesting kelp for **Kitty Lloyd**, later she ran an oyster lease with Ken Skarland and family. She married Don Noade in 1994; at the pirate's wedding she was two hours and four minutes late, "Icing the cake." At one point she was down and out. "Locals shipped me out for a year of repair. That was the most important year of my life. The Ebbas, Irmas, Pats, Eileens and others have defined who I strive to be." In 2012 she became post master. When asked about retirement, she replied, "I can't imagine living any place else, and I hope I die here, even if it is from licking stamps." Thanks Rose for being you. L. Druehl, collage by M. & J. Eileen shared her memories of being in and near London during the blitz: rationing was severe (1 oz cheese per week) but no one went hungry—most had gardens. Clothes were rationed, too, and people become clever at fashioning new from old. Planes seemed to be always flying overhead—theirs and ours. The flying bombs were a terror. Eileen recalled a movie theater, filled with children had been hit as had a tube (subway) entrance. Outside of the city, folks had steel Quon-



set huts for bomb shelters and in the city, a steel box, in the home that doubled as a table served the same purpose. Other city folks had designated seats in the underground railway stations. Eileen concluded with a sigh, referring to now, "We haven't learned a thing." L. Druehl
