
HFN/Steelhead LNG Project was updated at the February Affairs meeting. Costs: Sarita facility \$10 billion, the connecting 1000 km pipe \$8 billion. Benefits: up to 2000 construction jobs, 400 operation jobs and local spinoffs, support for HFN visions, and tax revenue for governments. Final investment decision Q1 2020. Boardwalk Nancy will join the ranks of earlier Bamfield notables: Salal Joe, Shaky Bill, and Swift Minnie, to name a few. Nancy **Sherry**, a dedicated fisher from birth, first came to Bamfield from Seattle, where she was a caterer, with her family in 1989, lured by our salmon. For 6 years they came to fish. First, they stayed in a



van with hammocks for the boys (Karl, 9 and Dean, 7) and a foamy, then a motor home, then in 1995 they bought their boardwalk place from Lindsey Quane. Earlier, this was the site of the fishing co-op and westside electric generator. She put Christmas lights up in Cougar Pass when her son Dean was ill. And 12 years ago, she initiated the perennial 1st of July Boardwalk party, in celebration of her becoming Canadian. For years, hers was the Bamfield place to jam, until the studio, earlier the westside road maintenance shed, was moved almost onto her lot. She has built rock walls, painted, but mostly cooked in Bamfield. She considers her family and the Myres family a combo, "They have been most generous." She loves cooking for the kids at school. She loves having little impact on our planet: "I walk everywhere." And for her, Bamfield is perfect: "Thank you Bamfield." Our chat concluded with her declaring, "I am an introvert!" L. <u>Dedicated to "Reviving our language</u> & Living our Culture," the Paawats Learning Center, located at Anacla has been active for 14 years. **Clara Clappis**, now a fulltime director, has been with the center for 10 years. Clara is a licenced in Early Childhood Education with extensive training in the Huu-ay-aht language and she continues upgrading her skills at workshops and confer-



ences. Following 8 years in residential school she married **Ben** and "dedicated myself to learning our language and customs." The center is licensed for the care of 12 children up to 5 years of age. The children are instructed in Huu-ay-aht language and customs. Kids from Anacla and Bamfield attend, with additional children in the summer from the Bamfield Marine Station. Following an August graduation, the children move on to K to 8 in Bamfield. The project is funded by the

<u>Salmon Enhancement at Sugsaw Hatchery.</u> The Huu-ay-aht First Nation run a salmon hatchery in Grappler Inlet, and have for over a decade. At the hatch-



ery salmon from two different streams are enhanced: Chum Salmon from Sugsaw Creek and Coho Salmon from Pachena River. The hatchery contributes an average of 80,000 Chum fry and 40,000 Coho Fry to the wild. The eggs are taken from returning adult salmon in the fall, and kept in egg trays at the hatchery until winter when they transition into their second life stage as Alevin (photo). Alevin transform their former egg sacs into a sort of lunch bag, attached to their bellies and will live off

the nutrient -rich yolk sac for a month or so. Following the Alevin life stage the fish grow into Fry, at this time they are then transferred from the trays into tanks where they can learn to swim and school together. Currently the Chum have transformed from Alevin into Fry. Coho are about a month behind and are still in the Alevin stage. In late spring the fish will be released into their natural streams to face the big, treacherous, natural world. Oh, the fascinating lifecycle of west coast salmon! *Amelia Vos*
