

Bamfield Marine Station pioneer, Dr. William C. Austin, passed peacefully March 22, 2018 in Victoria. Bill was a highly regarded marine biologist who studied marine life of the Pacific Coast of North America for close to 60 years. Born 24 March 1936 in New Jersey, Bill did graduate studies at Stanford University. After receiving his doctorate in 1966, he studied in Denmark for a year before taking a faculty position at Simon Fraser University. While at SFU he was responsible for designing the marine station labs. He left SFU to establish a consulting and research firm, the Khoyatan Marine Laboratory, and the Marine Ecology Centre. Bill inspired people with his unparalleled knowledge of marine life. He fought for the protection of rare 9,000 year old Glass Sponge Reefs along the BC coast. Many considered Bill, with his bohemian life style, a modern-day Doc as created by Steinbeck in Cannery Row. A celebra-



"Siixmuu" pronounced: She-Keh-Moo, is the Nuu-chah-nulth word for Pacific Herring Eggs; Nuu-chah-nulth people have been harvesting this resource since time immemorial and still harvest this delicacy using traditional practices.

In early Spring, Herring move into intertidal and subtidal areas of the coastline and spawn on anything neutrally buoyant: seaweed and eelgrass. The Herring eggs stick to these substances until they are ready to hatch; they do not die after spawning and will return in successive years to spawn again. Traditionally and currently, Nuu-chah-nulth Nations fall coniferous trees into the water in precise timing with the herring



spawn, creating an environment for the eggs to attach to; tree boughs will then be pulled out of the water and the roe pealed off to be eaten as a rich and tasty spring meal. Amelia Vos, photo herring roe on cedar

About 12 protesters gathered outside the Italian Hall where the Port Alberni Chamber of Commerce would hear updates from Steelhead LNG and Huu-ayaht First Nation. The group, led by ACRD Bamfield director, **Keith Wyton**, carried placards stating their opposition to the proposed LNG plant which could be built in Sarita Bay, in Huu-ay-aht traditional territory. Wyton said they were there to send a message to Steelhead LNG, that they are not in favor of the liquid natural gas plant being considered for Sarita Bay, near Bamfield. Wyton is affiliated with the Barkley Sound Alliance, that is opposed to Sarita Bay LNG and the Port Alberni Transshipment Hub. "We want to support Huu-ay-aht First Nations in their aspirations for self-determination but this project has wide impacts.
