A Fed Bear Is A Dead Bear! Lots of bears in town this year. It is important everyone secure bear attractants like garbage, compost, fruit trees and fish refuse. To prevent bear conflict, problems with bears need to be report right away. If a bear's behaviour is identified early on there is an opportunity to save it by driving it out of town. Electric fences prevent bears from returning. Bears that are allowed to become repeat offenders become habituated and end up getting euthanized. If you see a bear problem call RAAP at 1-877-952-7277.
