Huu-ay-aht begins \$150 Million Salmon Watershed Renewal Program. The Sarita River Watershed is the heart of Huu-ay-aht First Nations. For generations, the Sarita has served as a source of food, transportation, and cultural value to Huu-ay-aht people. However, after decades of commercial fishing and extensive forestry, the rivers and watershed in the *ḥahuuli* have been severely degraded. By 1997, 62 per cent of the Sarita watershed had been logged, including 97 per cent of the flood plain. "We have always taken care of the resources in our hahuuli, especially the Sarita River because it is the heart of our people," explains Tayii Hawił λiišin (Derek Peters). Huu-ay-aht hired LGL Ltd. in 2017 to develop a strategy for a Sarita and Pachena Watershed Renewal Program. Huu-ay-aht Chief Councillor Robert J. Dennis Sr. noted, "Now if you go around touring our land you will see our own people out working on these streams, restoring and renewing that habitat so that our salmon come back."
