Presently she is the Harbour Authority Dock Wharfinger, a kelp picker, a casual construction worker, and of course, a purveyor of fine vegetables. "Squash is my favourite vegetable." First, she used her veggies for trade, then Bamfield Mer-



cantile promoted her wares, now she has added a "Box Program" (subscriptions for \$10-\$20/week: salad and cooking greens, herbs, etc.). She likes that folks of all ages interact in Bamfield and that she has options for different kinds of work. Also, she is on the Community Forest Board. Her message: "Everyone has been so supportive.
