VIHA seeking weeks more water samples before lifting advisory. BCEP in discussion with Telus regarding loss of payphones/911 access. Regional District supports underwater cable grant to West Island Cable. Janessa Dornstrauder has resigned from the BCSA coordinator position. Cailean Meredith will be the interim coordinator. Les Jmaeff reported on behalf of the marine station (Thanks, Les): the station is working with HFN, advancing the sewage treatment plant. The 2018 Bamfield Road Safety Association AGM was attended by 4 residents, 3 directors, and industry/ government representatives Lance Windgrave (WFP), Ed Kleywegt (MFLNRORD), Stefan Yancey (MOTI), and Dale Martin & Geoff Gwynne (Mainroad Contracting). These latter representatives drove to Bamfield on Saturday to inform and advise the Association...Thank you! Some notes: You see an industry truck speeding, take the licence number and report. You see a vehicle in the ditch, if it is not marked, check. The bridge at the Headquarters Bay turn off will be moved to the bottom of 17 Mile Hill. Road use from Bamfield to Cameron Shop increased in 2018 to 230,000 from 191,000 in 2017 (Detailed analyses available in the school library). The present location of the Tsunami Warning Sign should be moved inland about 4 km, to the gravel pit to avoid embarrassing surprises. The WFP website should have road condition links. A stop sign is proposed for the intersection of Nuthatch and Pachena roads, making it an all-way stop. L. Druehl
