Another way to kill a Bamfield Bear. Thanks to Mandy Ross and the Bear Aware program, the killing by baiting is reduced: Folks are securing food items that attract bears. Now, boaters, including paddle boards and kayaks, are approaching bears on the beach. The presence of these curious folks disturbs the bears foraging and lowers the bears' fear of humans. Consider a mother sow preparing her cubs for the coming hibernation, requiring the limited low tides, being interrupted. In some instances, the bears learn to expect treats. At least in one local case a bear stalked a kayaker. This double whammy of habituating bears and limiting their foraging is a death knell. Recycling in west Bamfield. 25 residents and business owners joined Jenny Brunn (ACRD) at West Park (nee Pioneer Park) to brainstorm garbage, recycling and composting in west Bamfield. Amelia Vos ably chaired the meeting and gathered suggestions. Bamfield Mercantile provided pizza and drinks. Discussed were cost, logistics around pickup, storage and transportation, and how to encourage responsible drop-off. One idea was at facility at West Park with a free store, book exchange and gathering place, now sorely lacking in west Bamfield. Composting will await another day. Heather Wash-

And on the east side 16 participants, directed by Jenny Brunn, ACRD, learned about new developments in waste disposal: compositing that would service local gardeners, converting our glassware into sand, using the more dubious plastics to make fuel pellets, and how to break your mattress down into its recyclable units in 45 minutes (video). We were alerted to the possible amnesty for items presently not accepted at our depot: paint, batteries, and such. All Bamfield households will receive dumping vouchers for the Port Alberni facility. Amelia Vos suggested Alberni-bound waste could be pooled with those going in with empty trucks...gas money. There was discussion about the west side situation. Cherry tomatoes and marshmallow-chocolate cookies were provided. *L. Druehl*

Quick fix for Bamfield water system following a break on a 6-inch line in front of Kingfisher dock. According to **Les Butler**, immediately upon discovering

the break, **Brad Beaith** entered the inlet and spent 5 hours repairing the line (Thank you, Brad). A boil water advisory was put in place for the west side to allow the lines to be flushed and the water tested. Island Health shortened the advisory by accelerating the testing. Potable water was made available to the west side from the east side.



The cause of the rupture is not known but, according to **Jenny Brunn**, ACRD, engineers will determine how to better protect the system.

Our Sugsaw watershed is in good shape. Most Vancouver reservoirs are at 50-year lows. L. Druehl
