<u>Charmed by a chance visit to Aquilar House</u>, in 1984, <u>Larry</u> and <u>Linda Myres</u> set on a path leading to 25 years of volunteerism in Bamfield. After that first visit, they once occupied the Little Green House on the boardwalk. In 1993, they purchased

the **Logan** property, settling in fulltime in 1995 with their kids: **Mark** in K (now in charge of safety for BC Hydro, Vancouver Island), **Megan** in grade 2 (now in communications) and **Mathew** in grade 5 (now an independent building contractor). When asked what about Bamfield



impressed him most, Larry replied, "The feeling of strength Bamfield instilled in our kids." Right off the mark, in 1995, accountant Larry joined the Fire Department and Linda taught 'high school' at the marine station. Following years of lobbying, the Bamfield Community School Association came into being, with Linda the first coordinator. BCSA initiated a library, summer program for kids, the Bamfield Community Forest Assoc. and the Bamfield, HFN, BMS Abalone Project, The Beacon, the Netloft Gallery, and much more. Larinda (a collective established by their extended family) was widely involved in volunteer groups... "at one point we estimated we associated with 16 of 20 Bamfield organizations." Larry was an Accountant-inwaiting for most groups, often pro bono. Linda has spearheaded the Bamfield Emergency Program from its inception to now. For 'recreation', she has been a Marriage Commissionaire for 7 years, performing about 30 weddings. And always their home was open to 'orphans' and folks in need. They will settle in Nanaimo, where Larry will "continue on with accounting," and Linda will "carry on bravely." Thank you both! L. October Affairs. Regional Director, Bob Beckett's report: Telus is about to make BIG announcement re our cell coverage. Two meetings with the Premier & officials re road issues (cross your fingers). Linda reviewed the history of Bamfield Emergency Program and noted, "Bamfield may be a small village but it is very active." Jerry Gassner will replace Linda as coordinator. Bob Baden reviewed the development of our new parking project, noting the ACRD "was able to identify and mark the property line of Mr. Brent Kelly's property along Frigate Rd. however, the flagging tape placed on the ground soon disappeared and the property line became an issue as the project developed," see Bamfielder.ca for full report! It was agreed we should scope out what is required to complete the original parking project. Lisa Herbig noted we now have a responder unit (otherwise know as an ambulance). Charlie Clappis noted explorations into affordable housing, involving the HFN and BMSC. <u>Way to go Tofino</u>. Seven and half years after having the Tofino Hospital helipad shut down, Tofino once again has a helipad. This was made possible by the cooperation of neighbours (foliage, other obstructions) and \$800 K (replace old pad with a more substantial one). Mayor **Josie Osborne** noted by not having to drive to the airport, the time before a patient was airborne is reduced by ½ to 1 hour. *CBC Radio*, 3 *October*.
