Snows destroy original 'Bamfield Marine Station' on Rance Island, operated by Aubry Gorbman, former head of Zoology, University of Washington and President of the Zoological Society of America, in the 1970s. This lab specialized in slime eel (hag fish) physiology. Aubrey became a stanch supporter of BMSC (nee BMS) and in 1985 held an International NATO workshop at the station on physiology of primitive fishes. Later, there was a short-lived slime eel fishery in Barkley Sound. Their skin was

Last month we explored Roger Demontigny's role in establishing our volunteer fire department. He continues on with the BVFD but other projects loom. Roger was

one of the initial Bamfield Entertainment Committee members. At that time, a few Bamfielders received weak TV signals from Port Angles. They raised \$10 K at \$250 a throw from locals, "in no time at all. However, many watched but didn't pay." They purchased the receiver/ transmitter and built a 12 foot diameter dish from plywood, covered with aluminum foil. "The ladies gluing the foil on the disc seemed to hallucinate." Three channels

Tin Drum. Peter Janitis. who had been watching hockey broadcast from Port Angles, declared that now he could see the puck. Roger was the technical force

driving the



School Media club that broadcast weekly shows to the community..."the kids did everything needed to run a TV studio." From the early 1970's Roger was part of a group that pushed Centennial Park forward. "There was no committee, just workers." Camp sites, gazebos, the information centre, and then the Smiley Rink were established. They tried flooding the rink for skating, "...never worked." Now, almost fifty-years later, Roger can be seen cruising through the park, fixing what got broken. Roger is an avid hunter. He and Clifford Charles, Bert Jones, Bill Mather and Len Jennings formed the core of dedicated hunters that bivouacked out in the Kootenays for 10-day stints over the years. They had large walled, canvas tents and Len did the gourmand thing. Roger continues hunting and fishing, and he still responds to calls from locals in need of tele-assistance. That's what an Ultimate Volunteer does. L. Druehl

Sinking of the U. S. steamer Valencia in January 1906 is the worst maritime disaster of the infamous Graveyard of the Pacific. Stuck on a reef at Pachena Point with helpless press and rescue crews nearby, the vessel broke up over 36 hours, leaving 136 dead and only 37 alive—no woman or child survived (they were launched, first, in lifeboats). In response to public outrage, Canada upgraded West Coast marine services with new lighthouses, upgraded marine charts and land-based rescue facilities, improved communications, a powered lifeboat and the West Coast Trail.

Should there be a repeat of the Valencia tragedy today, a distress call to the MCTS Centre (Coast Guard Radio) would activate a major marine disaster plan initiated by the Joint Rescue Coordination Centre in Victoria. Immediately, Coast Guard stations and vessels in the area as well as any "vessels of op-portunity" would be tasked as well as available Canadian and U.S air support. The Bamfield stationed Cape MacKay would likely be the on-scene coordinator controlling activities until a larger



CCG vessel could take over. Casualties would also be transported to the BMSC for care and registry, as the marine station makes for an excellent Casualty Reception point with it's docks and facilities. The CCG will be conducting a Mass Rescue Operation Exercise off Port Hardy in the fall, focusing on integrating local response plans with the Regional MAJMAR Plan.
