In response to a TNB query, "The [sewage] plant is an MBBR (moving bed biological reactor) with a planned capacity to serve up to 1100 people. The sewer system is currently 18-24 months away from being fully operational. There is a plan to incorporate connections for Bamfield citizens, however more planning is required to be able to accommodate. <u>Post disaster survival</u>. A 2-day Emergency Preparedness Workshop, conducted by **Sybille Sanderson** Collaborative Consulting and sponsored by Bamfield Community Emergency Program, opened with 25 people in attendance. The first session identified likely disasters (many) and 5 were explored in depth: Loss of water, Extreme weather, Seismic

related events, Oil spill, Forest fire. The discussions were lively and thoughtful. Some interesting points: Guests of commercial operations are the responsibility the hosts; at any particular time the population of Bamfield/Anacla could



be double the number of residents (Pachena camp ground, marine station); medications are the individual's responsibility, the Health Clinic has minimal drugs on hand.
