
Spiritually motivated, George Nookemus, born 1 November 1952, resides and carves at 420 Kiixin Road in Anacla. He recalls attending the Bamfield Eric Godson Memorial School not being a pleasant experience. He did share a math reader with Linda Ostrom in the third grade. Other school mates included the Jennings sisters, the Logan boys, the Janitis girls, the Burkholder kids and AI, the Hanson boy. He happily recalls Molly Fullerton, the sub-teacher and Margaret Pardy, the Red Cross nurse. A chronic asthmatic condition interrupted his schooling...he spent many prolonged visits in the Nanaimo Indian Hospi-



tal. In grade six, he was challenged to draw the King of Spades playing card on a large sheet of paper. From that point onward. his destiny as a artist was assured. He sold his first mask at age 14. He describes his drawing and carving skills as being self-taught and being driven by visions, but recognizes the influence of his father. Edward, a carver and his mother. Mabel. who was a master

Huu-ay-aht basket weaver, as was her mother, before her. He learned carving the "old way" from **Fred Peters**, with whom he carved canoes and totems. He makes his own tools, from formidable adzes for large pieces to delicate chisels for his hummingbird carvings. His subjects, the sea otter and the blue heron and the salmon are derived from encounters around the Cape Beale headland. Most recently he has been working on killer whale pieces (photo, a commissioned 8-foot carving of a breached whale he observed off Ohiat, near Helby). A smaller version was presented to Keith Wyton in honour of his tenure as Regional Director. He worked at the Raven Song on the Victoria waterfront and has done projects with the BC Royal Museum, that has acknowledged his excellence. His marketing is word-of-mouth: Senator Bill Bradley, Ret. (a presidential candidate and pro NBA basketball player who reaped All-American and pro Hall-of-Fame honours) acquired a Sun Mask from George. To be continued.

Heroic night recalled. Clifford Charles reminisced at a Port Alberni Maritime Heritage Society meeting on the life-threatening events of 29 February 1976. A storm struck during the herring season, catching many off guard. The Cape Beale lighthouse keeper spotted the Bruce I., a herring seiner, floundering near shore. Martin Charles and his son, Clifford, Capt. David Christney and Bob Amos of the Bamfield Lifesaving Station set off for Cape Beale. They pulled two men from a raft and started home, only to discover there were 2 men left behind. They returned and discovered a third clinging to the rock,10 meters up. The US Coast Guard was called, and they dispatched a helicopter that retrieved the rockbound survivor, only to crash. Now the Bamfield crew rescued all aboard the helicopter. All were awarded for their bravery and Martin had a Hero Class patrol named M. Charles M. B. (= Medal of Bravery). Abstracted from Alberni Valley News, 13 March, 2019.

A major decision reached. At a special Community Affairs meeting, 29 April, 29 attendees considered funding of east side parking. Bernie Whyton provided background and Bob Baden advanced the application for \$28 K from Community Affairs, in addition to about \$25 K donated by highways in the form of culverts, concrete barriers and signage and, hoped for, gravel from the Huu -ay-aht First Nations. The primary issue was public safety and secondary, parking for west siders and west side businesses. When asked if the Chamber of Commerce would contribute, Bob replied, "They declined to participate." Other concerns were how to enforce no parking signs (RCMP could ticket when they are in town); are we liable (no); could parking spots be assigned to lodges and such (this is a possibility, but first the construction). Following the public meeting, all 11 directors met to make the final decision. The motion to provide up to \$25 K for the project was approved. This was not a unanimous decision. L. Druehl
