

Over-packed Ross Hall at the marine station launched the Bamfield Historical Society's annual membership drive. The 38 attendees were treated to light snacks and speaker, Jim Moncur (photo, Jim with coach, Debbie, bottom right). Jim, a coastal piolet, regaled us with stories of an \$800 taxi ride

Hey, what's this? On May 11th BMSC and HFN hosted a Bioblitz on Pachena Bay within the traditional territories of the Huu-ay-aht First Nations. Students, scientists and members of the public gathered to document the diversity of life in our own backyard. Led by Drs Brian Starzomski (University of Victoria), John Reynolds (Simon Fraser University), Mindi Summers (University of Calgary), Hugh

MacIntosh, and Louis Druehl (Port Desire and Simon Fraser University) we logged over 600 observations and documented nearly 200 species!



This event was part of Science Odyssey - Canada's largest festival for science and technology, and supported by PromoScience a branch of the Natural Science and Engineering Research Council of Canada. *Tao Eastham*

The yellowing of Bamfield (and Vancouver Island). This is a banner year for scotch broom, an invasive pant pushing out native species and as a bonus is a fire hazard. Roadsides and disturbed places are a rich yellow. Each plant has the potential of producing 18,000 seeds per year that can lie dormant 20 -30 years. BloomBusters who's motto is "Cut the Bloomin' Broom", advise, that except for very small plants, do not pull. Cut the flowering plants near the ground.

Do not disturb the soil as this will invite germination of dormant seeds. Attack outliers first, then the central population. Watching Broom sex is fun. The flowers need a heavy bee to depress the petals, thus releasing the male anther, which snaps down on the bee's back, delivering pollen. You can watch this, while taking a break from cutting. *L. Druehl*

<u>Spiritually motivated (cont'd)</u>. When you enter master carver, **George Nookemus'** home, you are greeted by

carvings scattered around the living area, a large commissioned killer whale dominates one corner. Off to the side is a room where he finishes his pieces, accompanied by an ancient transistor radio, tuned to 101 FM. Presently, he is working on a goose carving (photo) that he estimates will take well over 200 hours to complete. From this room, one enters a 'curing room' where roughed-out pieces are held under burlap wraps for up to a year. Next and last, the



totem room where George has been creating a complex totem for the past few years. This room has been added on to the original residence to accommodate this impressive work. Reviewers have noted, "He examines the wood and receives spiritual visions of what that piece will become." and "If you look hard enough you will see other transformations." No one is learning carving skills from him, but Phil Roberge does drop by for carving sessions and chats. He worries that the art of carving is in danger of being lost like the Huu-ay-aht language (he is a speaker). He would welcome exploring carving with aspiring artists. I interviewed George to create a thumbnail sketch of this local artist for The New Bamfielder and I finished knowing Master Carver George Nookemus deserved a full-fledged biography. L. Druehl
