He was 72 years of age. Joe worked for Parks Canada for 27 years and leaves behind the love of his life, **Heather**, his three children Daisy (Jason), Zack (Inga) and Fia (Alex) and five grandchildren. Joe's dedication to the things he did, professionally and personally, was wholehearted. Whether it was building a cable bridge over a deep canyon in a remote and rugged wilderness, assisting in leading a team of horses to their back country winter lodging in the Rocky Mountains or Lighthouse Keeping, he was cool under pressure, with a tenacity that saw him through demanding situations. Equal to this he was kind and playful, with a gentle and generous heart. He genuinely appreciated the camaraderie of the company he kept, and the stories he loved to tell would revolve around the people, as much as the things they did. He had an easygoing, down-to-earth character and delighted in the world



around him. Throughout the decline of his health Joe remained calm and pleasant and without complaint, noble and brave in the face of adversity to the very end.
