June Community Affairs Zooms ahead. 44 entities, some nameless and faceless, sat through a long meeting. Major issue was Bamfield access to Pachena Beach via Anacla. In a word, no access, either through Anacla or through Parks Canada Trail head. COVID-19 updates. Robert Dennis HFN: HFN a vulnerable community; feels HFN should have access to testing, limiting access to Anacla. Heather Peterson Bamfield Health Clinic: Overview of BC Covid situation and requirements, clinic advertising for 2nd nurse position, discussed need for masks and testing. Angeline (works in infection control) clarified issues around masks and testing. Marnie McAughtrie Bamfield C. of C: recommends our message should say 'Bamfield has started a slow reopening, however, not all business are open. We are all following guidelines for Covid safety.' Boardwalk traffic an issue...keeping distance and wearing masks. Bob Beckett ACRD: Cell phone access remains closer to being improved, westside recycling being considered, ACRD applied for housing study grant, coordination at all level of goverrnent essential. HFN/Marine Station sewer system advancing with a June 2021 flush date. Bamfield road could be chipped-sealed for \$30 million. Request sent to BC Treasury.

Community Forest Happy Trails!! In July, two technicians will be hired to flag over 15 km of trails in our Community Forest that will visit large old growth and culturally modified trees, scenic and historic areas and natural points of interest such as bogs. Trail building will start shortly thereafter. This project is made possible with funding from the BC Rural Dividend Program to assist with economic development and recovery following COVID-19. The Board is putting together a plan to harvest up to 3000 cubic meters of downed and standing trees before the end of 2020. S. Ochman
