A Tale of Two Projects. In 1999 the Bamfield/Huu-ay-aht Community Forest and the Bamfield/Huu-ayaht/Bamfield Marine Station Abalone projects were initiated. The community Forest is well established and meeting its objectives. The abalone project was to rear abalone for outplanting in areas over harvested/poached. Its operation was to be financed, after an initial \$1.5 million from the governments, from the sale of abalone. The sale of legal abs would discourage poachers, in addition to restock the fisheries. Thousands of abs had been transplanted to Barkley Sd. and thousands more were ready to outplant when the government shut down the project. Lost were 4 good jobs, a smooth-operating abalone hatchery & a means to combating wild stock destruction by poaching. The poaching continues, unabated. Presently, the facility is occupied by Nova Harvest. L. Druehl

Their homestead lies 13 kilometers outside of Bamfield nestled in the trees next to Black Lake. It is a beautiful place: teeming with life and brimming with that good oxygen. What they have is a slice of magic, but underneath it all lies years of hard work. "We purchased the property on April fool's day, and my it's been quite the trick!" says Jan, poking fun at the challenges of off grid life. From building their current two story house out of earth mortar, to installing a water wheel and solar panels, Jan and Nelson have never been short of things to do or fix. Living off grid is hard work, but their tenacity and faith- against all odds- has enabled them to keep the dream alive. As a result, their property has been a warm and inspiring sanctuary

for many young woofers (organic farming volunteers), who have gone to learn about sustainable living, organic gardening, alternative healing, and mindfulness. This past summer, they had a woofer named **Sarah Moore** from Ontario who spent her summer tending to their turnips, beets (and Moore)! Jan and Nelson



Bamfield School, St. Ann's Academy and later the University of Toronto where she received a degree in Theology. Mary returned to Bamfield in the sixties to live with her father in his later years. She was very much a part of the

Bamfield community, worked as a telephone operator and enjoyed being leader of the Girl Guides. For the past two decades, she has been living in Port Alberni. Throughout her life, Mary often returned to visit Bamfield and was never happier than when she was swimming at Brady's Beach. She will be remembered for the love and care of family and friends and kindness to animals. Happy to report 8 derelict boats were removed from the Grappler area/inlet. Work was completed by TimberRose Ventures in 2 days. Rita Johnson, HFN. During the summer of 2020 the Natural Resource team worked with Tim-

berRose Tug and Barge to remove the derelict and abandon vessels from Grappler Inlet in Huu-ay-aht marine territory. Grappler Inlet is the outflow location for Sugsaw Creek, the system that the Huu-ay-aht Sugsaw Creek Hatchery enhances Chum. The



environmental health of this estuary is important to returning adult salmon and migrating juvenile salmon, and the abandon vessels were causing environmental degradation to the area (*Bamfield Corkboard*).

Bamfield COVID Schooling. I would like to welcome new primary teacher Laura Schmitt who joined us right out of teacher college in Alberta. She is young, energetic and jumped right in, teaching students in grades K-3 this year. She looks forward to meeting new faces and integrate into our wonderful community. Remembrance Day, 11 November, in Bamfield. In the past Bamfielders have met in the Community Hall, more recently in Eileen Scott's home, and, soon, in the new Community Hall. Curt Smecker describes the formation and duties of a Bamfield Home Guard during WW II. "No. 14 Company of the PCMR was also put in place to help protect the area. It was under the command of Captain G. Wellburn (Sept 9, 1942 - Feb 1, 1943) and Sid Fry (the Bamfield Customs Agent) subsequently. They were issued helmets, respirators, armbands, first aid kits and possibly .303 Lee Enfield Rifles or 30-30 lever action rifles. (for Curt's full report, Bamfielder.ca)."
