This year's Blue Monday saw 26 attendees glued to their January Affairs Zoom screens. Of note, Bob Beckett (ACRD) announced home care and palliative care are now available through our clinic. <u>Chickadees Counted</u>. Bamfield's 34<sup>th</sup> annual Christmas bird count started under red skies on December 31<sup>st</sup>. Twenty-nine birders observed more than 2500 birds repre-



senting 64 species. The data contribute to the oldest and largest citizen science project in the world. The Canadian Coast Guard, Bamfield Marine Science Center, Bamfield Mercantile and Breakers Marine, Mark Laws and Neil Wright contributed transportation for the count which would have been impossible without the guidance of Anne Stewart. The red sky warned of a stormy New Year's Eve. Birders (and birds) were

<u>Giant Kelp Reforestation</u>. The Bamfield Marine Sciences Centre and Bamfield's Canadian Kelp Re-

sources, Ltd. are assessing Green Gravel as a means of restoring the giant kelp forest that has been lost from in front of the Mercantile Store. (Green Gravel is gravel that has baby kelp on its surface.) Studies by **Chris Neufeld** 



and **Sam Starko**, working out of the marine station, have shown giant kelp beds in Barkley Sound are being diminished. These beds are essential fish habitat, including salmon. *L. Druehl*.
