House behind the fish camp, where they hosted Movie & Martini Nights. Barb was active in the Bamfield C. of C. and Community Hall Society. Her family donated an electric organ to the Community Hall/Church (Where is the organ now?). She loved her friends, her music, and her cat companions, and was a fabulous

hostess. Another passion was travel. Barb visited many parts of the world, Italy being a recent favourite. Barb is part of the fabric that is Bamfield. She will be missed. A celebration of Barb's life will be held when COVID restrictions are lifted. *Family and Friends*

The Community Forest has arrived...finally! After decades of bureaucratic struggle, the BHCF now has a strong educational program (HFN Youth Warriors forest skills, school kids tree planting, sponsoring the Fungal Fest), a community support program (Grants-in-aid, free firewood, recreational trails), a sustainable forest management plan, and a strong bank account (\$738,379.85). The new Grappler to Binnacle trail (The Boomer Trail) and an associated loop (The Serenity Loop) offer Bamfielders and visitors an exciting new vista. The first issue, more than any subsequent issue, caused a stir by printing, "A tourist: 'Those boys hanging out on the boardwalk remind me of the goats on the Comb's Farmers Market roof." This issue received more notoriety, as its classified ad, "Wanted old stewing chickens, dead and defeathered. Eileen," was cited on Victoria's CBC radio Thursday's review of small island presses. (120 issues later, and still no more CBC!). The first Marc Phillips collage appeared in issue 3 (A July 1 celebration of the Huu-ay-aht's 1 August 2011 treaty successes). Heather Washburn took us online with issue 9 and an expanded homepage. Monthly hits have reached over 5000, but not consistently. Issue 14 introduced colour. Issue 75 was to be the last (hence 120/75). Financially, TNB is a failure. There have been 9 online contributions (Thank You!). Donations in local

outlets (The Market, Bamfield Builders, Bamfield Merchantile and the Post Office...a big Thank you!) have raised around \$3000 in ten years. Our youth program has offered music lessons (guitar, piano), art and sewing lessons, and assistance to



youths travelling to sport competitions. These have been coordinated by the Bamfield Community School Association that handles all donations and payouts. Your little backwater press will keep soldiering on. Send your news, obits, bitches and we will publish them. Our editorial policy is that there is one Bamfield; east, west and south are directions and not places. Lumber prices soar above \$1630, up from \$830 January 2021.

<u>Does this drive tree poaching?</u> Vancouver Island timber poachers strike Bamfield? Is this a continuation of the poaching on the North Cowichan Community forest that has lost many fir and red cedar trees?

And does this drive investment? Huumiis Ventures Limited Partnership owned by the Huu-ay-aht First Nations and Western Forest Products Inc. announced acquisition of an incremental 28 per cent ownership interest in TFL 44 from Western, for \$22.4 million, giving Huumiis a 35 per cent ownership interest. The closing of this stage of the transaction paves the way for the acquisition of a further 16 per cent ownership bringing Huumiis' ownership interest to 51 percent. *Excelsior!*

And invite protectors? Huu-ay-aht educate public driving on their territory on respect, safety and forest etiquette. This step is being taken in response to a forestry safety incident on Thursday, May 6, 2021 involving a Huu-ay-ahtowned forestry cutblock. Eye-witness accounts confirm a forestry protester drove through safety barriers into an active logging area, putting the safety of the driver and the forestry workers at risk

Ah, shucks, BCAA CEO Eric Hopkins* announced in the BCAA Magazine, Summer 2021 issue, the launching of a small business insurance program. Noting, "I know this [need] firsthand, as my parents have owned and operated a small business for 40 years. The first commercial kelp farm in North America, their enterprise on the west coast of Vancouver Island and continues to produce kelp seed for kelp farmers and conservationists today. 'Find your kelp' is not just a promotional slogan, but a battle cry for my parents. Over the years I have seen the effort they have put into protecting their life's work." *This is not a BCAA endorsement, but prideful shout-out for our son. Louis and Rae.

Prolonged Community Affairs for May, zoomed by 40 folks, lasted 3 hours 8 minutes. Highlighted was a presentation by a kayak group wanting access to 6 sites in the Deer Group (for some reason this item was previewed under 'Correspondence' prior to a lengthy discussion). Charlie Clappis noted the Bamfield Road work is divided into 6 sections, with the Frederick Lake to Sarita Lake section to be started this summer (steep hills will be paved, other parts chip-sealed). JP Hastey: Lease agreement for new Hall about to be signed. Let the Hall group know your Hall desires (try the post office). Phil Lavoie: Death sentence for east side fire truck delayed for 5 years. West side will need a new truck. John Mass upped his grant-in-aid request by \$4000 bringing the total requested for east side parking to \$14,000 for 10 new parking spots. Vigorous discussion followed until Chair Jamie Willock tabled the item (good move, JW). The AGM, that preceded the regular meeting resulted with this slate of directors: Glen Ballman, Julie Bradley, Susan Derasp, Doug Greer, Jared Higgins, John Mass, Jaleen Rousseau, Jan Teversham, Stella Wenstob, Jamie Willock.
