Notable items: (Stefan Ochman) The Community Forest is seeking \$100 K for micro-mill to be located on Tanya Porter's lot (now owned by Bruce Pow) and could hire 2 employees to cut Community Forest logs. Harbour Authority (Rae Hopkins) The AGM will be held in July and they will be looking for a new dock manager to replace Amy McConnell. School (Julie Bradley) Robin Schmidt, who will be replacing Kristin Russell, will be joining her daughter, Laura Schmidt, in teaching. Affairs (Directors) BCFS bylaws were tidied up.
