Remembering John Nelson Case. Jack Case came to Bamfield in the 60's. He fell in love with Bamfield and set about finding things to support himself. He was a keen diver. He taught us swimming lessons in the bay at the Manse beach. Jack was demanding but passed us all! Other jobs included beach-combing with Roald Ostrom, diving, tutoring, photography and inventing. Jack's property and float house was on Burlo Island (now Howard Joe's) and his creative base for Case Existological. Jack



and Mai Leemet were the second couple to marry in the church in 1961, They moved to Victoria where daughter Rory and son John were born. Using his naval architect training and with a partner started a business. They designed and built the Underseas Gardens, worked on BC Ferries extensions, cutting the ferries in half to expand their length, designing the ramp in the hold to carry more cars. He designed the SeaBus for

Vancouver harbour. Jack worked, consulted and studied designs in other countries and also worked in Alaska, Texas, and Seattle at Boeing. He was a thinker, dreamer and artist. Throughout his work life Jack was supported by Mai, his life-mate and anchor. He was hugely proud of his son and daughter and their accomplishments. In retirement, Jack wrote several books; one documenting a tragic sinking of a boat in Michigan where friends were lost. Another 'A Yank in Canada' and then a history of Mai's family's life and escape from Estonia to Sweden and then ultimately to Canada. 
