The tale of two Bamfield teachers. First on the scene in 2020, Laura Schmitt, fresh out of the U. of A, with a teaching degree focused on elementary grades applied for over 30 positions, choosing Bamfield. I first encountered her on her Friday afternoon's run on Pachena Beach. Now she surfs with a small local group. She has surfed on Third Beach



while camping: "Surf, sleep, surf, sleep." Now she involves herself with the Bamfield Volunteer Fire Department and First Responders, keeping Monday nights free for instructing Hip Hop dancing in the school. When asked about her inaugural Bamfield teaching, "I was nervous, for sure. I'd done practicums, but these students were mine, all mine!" She sees Bamfield teaching opportunities do not exist elsewhere, "a pioneer." Laura's enthusiasm for things Bamfield

encouraged her parents to purchase a home in Bamfield. Her dad, **Bob**, had retired and her mum, **Robin** (BA Ed. U. of A, MA Ed. U. Lethbridge with a focus on French) had 28 years teaching in Medicine Hat. Having a home in Bamfield and then an opportunity to teach here



cinched it. Robin looks forward to enjoying Bamfield's outdoors, hiking, kayaking, and wants to explore ways to interact with the community. Worldly issues (COVID-19, Climate Change, Truth and Reconciliation) are considered, as appropriate, at K to 10 with the kids responding in thoughtful but distinct ways. According to the teachers, Bamfield Community School is operating smoothly with good support from

SD 70. The kids are keen and they look after each other. No bullying here! And **Jaslyn Haberl** runs a remarkable kitchen. Robin and Laura are excited to explore ways the school can grow to meet the greater community needs. *L. Druehl*

Bamfield Volunteer Kudos to Bob Baden for his efforts/frustrations in resolving Bamfield parking issues; JP Hastey for securing property for the new Hall; Rose Janelle & Tish McPhee Bamfield's spiritual role models; Marnie McAughtrie for initiatives, making Bamfield a more enjoyable place; Stefan Ochman for decadal, effective and persistent advancing road safety and our community forest; Heather Cooper for advancing our history, **Les Butler*** for chasing leaks in our ancient water system and **Patrick** McNamara* for sorting our garbage; Volunteers Phil Lavoie (BVFD), Amanda Vos (First Responders) & their Crews, including the perennial Roger Demontigny, for their most demanding and essential Bamfield services; Bob Beckett Bamfield's promoter and protector in the outside world; James Willock & Jan Teversham for facilitating village communication; Ron McDowell & Siobhan Gray who, behind the scenes, are always supportive; all Bamfielders that quietly support our Unincorporated Village; the Huu-ay-aht who personally and at the political level support us; the BC Hydro Crews* that manage to keep us on the grid; the TNB for bias, persistent, well illustrated, and perhaps entertaining reporting, and complete failure at raising funds for kids activities; and for Family, Friends, & Detractors for ignoring, stimulating, and hindering those named above in their pursuits. Cozy in their little nests, 39 Bamfielders zoomed through November Affairs. Our Regional Director, Bob Beckett noted the RCMP are working on a policing policy to accommodate expected tourism growth in Bamfield. Robin Schmitt noted the school has 19 students and that **Laura Schmitt** has started 'Ready Set Learn' for incoming kindergarteners, involving Clara Clappis and Paawats children. Sally Mole fights on for full community school association funding. Tuesdays basketball was attended by 30 dribblers. Stefan Ochman, Community Forests, "calls for bids for a 2.5 km trail from the end of South Bamfield Road to the coast have been called for." Sheryl Mass, Bamfield Parks, noted, thanks to Malcom Richards, the Smiley Rink (named after Leonard Jennings boat & his favourite fish) is refurbished. Amelia Vos happily announced 5 members of the BVFD are now certified First Responders. BVFD Fire chief, Phil Lavoie said they have accepted a bid for a new mini-pumper truck for the east side; ACRD will consider financing of this project. Art Council's Julie Bradly noted the annual Christmas Craft Fair will be held Saturday, 4 December, in the Rix Centre from 11am-4pm. Vaccine Passports and mask will be mandatory. Two grants-in-aid proposals to Community Affairs were advanced. James Willock, on behalf of Community Affairs, requested \$6,500 for the Bamfield Active Transport Network as part of the estimated \$26,000 total (\$13,100 from the Min. of Transport confirmed). The project entails 3 new trails on the west side and unpowered boat launch and storage facilities on each side of Bamfield Inlet. Jan Teversham, on behalf of the Pavilion Group requested \$5000 (but hopefully \$2000, exact amount to be finalized by the end of 2021). This grant is to cover past expenses of 12 architecture students who are developing plans for a West Park pavilion and other park facilities. These proposals will be reviewed at the next Affairs, following which they will be decided on by our Affairs Directors. L. Druehl abstracted from Jan Teversham's minutes.

<u>Bamfield's favourite theatrical event</u>, the Bamfield Community School's Christmas concert (Vacc passport & masks required) will be held at the school 6:30 – 7:30, Tuesday, December 14. This is always a crowd pleaser. And this year is special, as it will be a 'coming out' event for our school kids after a restrictive COVID season.

One Bamfield or two? In the beginning (before Bamfield Main opened in 1962) Bamfield consisted of homes for aboriginals, non-aboriginals, including 10 Japanese families. This village was connected by water—Bamfield and Grappler Inlets. No matter where you lived, you had to go by boat. World II removed the Japanese and the opening of Bamfield Main led to an expansion of Anacla. Further, Bamfield Main gave road access to Port Alberni and beyond: an easier access for folks living in east Bamfield than west Bamfield. Slowly, much of Bamfield's infrastructure moved from west to east. First was the Community Hall, then the school and finally, the health clinic. Today, the only reason



eastsiders must go to the west side is to get their mail (of course friendships require otherwise). At one time, Bamfielders took perverse pride in having to boat across the inlet to attend dances and meetings...there was something special about coming out of miserable weather into a steamy hall packed with friends where you could debate issues or jive or share food. Are gentrification, COVID, and 21st Century expectations molding a different Bamfielder? Zoom meetings, a potential west side meeting pavilion, scarcity of moorage point to a cleaving of Bamfield. The looming new

Community Hall, the potential of cross inlet kayak/canoe moorage, an excellent water taxi service and a sprinkling of gumbooters signal the potential of a One Bamfield.
