A snappy 1 hour March Community Affairs, attended by 28, was highlighted by Budget Considerations and a thoughtful Bear Aware presentation. Gas Tax monies are considered for funding \$150K Liquid Waste, 2022; \$500K repair of submarine line westside water system, 2024; \$400K westside fire hall, 2024; \$100K Bamfield Parks administration, moorage and playground upgrade, 2025. Mandy Ross outlined our coinhabitation with bears and how to move forward with our stewardship. Sean Rogers (BMSC) introduced the Kelp Rescue initiative and stated a full summer program is on. Robin Schmitt (School): 3 new students = 25 total! Masks will be optional. Duane Nookemus (HFN) the wastewater system will open in April. A 4-plex and duplex are completed in upper Anacla. 




SUSTAINABLE VEGGIES FOR BAMFIELD/ANACLA Veggies in Port: bunches of radish \$2.99, green onions \$1.29, green leaf Lettuce \$4.69, carrots \$4,69, and broccoli \$4.69, and in our community gardens: seeds and your sweat! Our gardens welcome you: Anacla (Zelda Clappis & Stefan Ochman) consisting of 17 raised beds, a potting shed and green houses for villagers, with medicinal plantings, is funded by a First Nations Food Grant. West Park (Andrea Butler) host a community herb garden, flower beds, and raised planters. We look forward to a boat load of dahlias this summer! You won't miss us on your way to the new West Park Pavilion in mid summer. Eileen Scott Centennial Park (Rae Hopkins) has 12 raised beds, a potting/tool shed, communal grapes and a fig tree. The Community School garden is being revitalized with a donation of soil from Bamfield Builders. The cost of plants, seeds, and watering infrastructure has been donated by the BCSA. Gardening is done by the students overseen by **Julie Bradley** and consultation with the school lunch program coordinator, Jaslyn Haberl, for the lunch program. FIRESMART GRANT FUNDING AWARDED! The ACRD has received the 2022 FireSmart grant for \$240,000 to undertake local FireSmart prevention of wildfires. In Bamfield we will work on mitigation work on critical infrastructure, provide public education and offer FireSmart tips to reduce the risk of wildfires, and offer the FireSmart Home Assessment & Rebate program to residents up to \$500.
