

A Village Loss. Lars came to Bamfield with his wife, Georgiana, in the 1970s and has been a Bamfielder ever since. He spent one winter living in a tent as he rebuilt the Farm House on Aguilar Point. Previously, he had been an industrial diver, Maître d' at the Hotel Vancouver, a realtor. In Bamfield, carpentry was his most notable trade. Lars championed west side roads within the village and by reaching out to the powers-that-be. A vocal participant in Community Affairs (but not Zoom), he challenged/advanced issues facing the community. He built his final home, The Light of Aquarius Centre where he led meditation. Decades of coffees with Boardwalkers and meeting the Lady Rose ferry provided a well-worn path from the boardwalk to his retreat. When his time came. he put his affairs in order and quietly left. A Lucky Day when John M. Green established his prime tide pool fish research site,12 km out of Bamfield on the Telegraph Trail (now West Coast Trail) in 1966. In 1968, I was asked to chair a Marine Station Site Selection Committee, representing 5 western universities. In 1969, we visited nominated sites (Victoria, Sooke, Port Renfrew, Tofino/Ucluelet) by float plane. As we were flying across Barkley Sound, I recalled John Green suggested we consider Bamfield. We did, and it was perfect. The rest is history. John continued sampling his west coast site, almost every year. This year, he was

represented by his daughter **Teresa Green** (foreground, photo by **M. Kujundzic).** His study\*, spanning 50 years, provides a rare and highly significant baseline when considering marine response to climate change. And chats on the beach, after intertiding, with Cuban cigars, cheap whiskey, green flashes, led to the **Bamfield Marine Station**.

Wild Roses or Scotch Broom...our choice. Wild Roses are pretty, pink, smell nice, are rich in vitamin C, and make delicious tea. And in the other corner...Scotch Broom invades sunny, disturbed roadsides, and areas of recent logging. Scotch broom increases the intensity of wildfires, is poisonous, and crowds out native plants that animals depend on. A mature plant lives up to 25 years and produces seeds that survive in the soil for 30 years. In celebration of the BMSC's 50th anniversary, the centre is holding a year-long biodiversity sampling event, or "bioblitz", to document all the species living around Barkley Sound. This event



brings together community members, undergraduate students, researchers and invited experts. So far, there are 4635 observations of 870 species (see <a href="https://www.inaturalist.org/projects/bmsc-50th-anniversary-bioblitz">https://www.inaturalist.org/projects/bmsc-50th-anniversary-bioblitz</a>). On the weekend of June 10-12, BMSC invited experts in different taxonomic groups to lead community

walks. The "bioblitz" is meant to call back to the

What's in a name? Councillor Robert Dennis noted interest in revisiting local place names. In a recent CBC Radio broadcast, John Jack commented on the possible renaming of Sproat Lake, named after Gilbert Malcolm Sproat out of concern for his activities as Government Agent for the west coast of Vancouver Island. In a parallel situation, in 1861 Gov James Douglas appointed William Edward Banfield an Indian agent based in Barkley Sound, near what would become Bamfield (mis-spelled), making him the first settler in the sound. Lets keep our bears safe! It is important that we manage our attractants so bears do not become habituated to people or food conditioned. One of the main attractants is fish refuse in the intertidal. A lot of fish cleaning stations are close to the shore resulting in waste piling up in the intertidal. This attracts bears, bringing them into close proximity with people and other potential attractants. If you do have a dock that is close to shore, please throw your waste off your boat in deep water.
