Bamfield Harbour Authority Controversy. Since 1952, Bamfielders have managed the west side moorage facilities (aka Fishermens' Dock). Their responsibilities were to maintain the floats for the government and assure the limited moorage spaces were equitably distributed among the villagers and visitors. Fees were charged to meet these functions. Recently, the Authority has been challenged in its distribution of moorage space and this has required a lawyer's assistance to the tune of \$6292...an expense not covered by the Authority budget. A Grant-in-Aid was sought from Community Affairs, to cover this extraordinary expense. The Affairs Board turned the Authority down on the grounds it did not contribute to Bamfield (my words). This Affairs Board decision deprived the Authority of a public hearing. If the Authority presented, the public could advise the Board and then the Board could say no, or not. The question is, does protecting community moorage deserve the same credit as creating new moorage? Let the public voice their opinion. *L. Druehl*


27 Folks Zoomed in February's Affairs meeting. Our perennial bearer of good news Terri Fong presented Bamfield's ACRD 2023-2027 budget. Bottom line there will be a 21% property tax increase, coming to about \$150/ household. This reflects increased costs, particularly for fire fighting (two independent systems needed for east/west sides), waste removal, along with general inflation. \$26,000 for Bamfield Parks (\$8000 transferred to park, remainder withheld for ACRD services).13 building permits were issued last year (9 residential, 3 commercial, 1 shed). Ben Howells: a Pachena Bay Music Festival will be held 14-16 July, 500-800 attendees expected. Regional Director **Bob Beckett** will seek ways to reduce property taxes. He described the Ukraine/Bamfield connection. Bamfield Marine Station's director **Sean Rogers** noted two Ukraine high school students will be visiting Vancouver Island, in conjunction with Bob Beckett. He noted the growth in kelp forest research has been the success story for 2022. Jaslyn Herbel (School Association) noted an active program (check newsletter) the always appreciated community lunch on 9 March, and an informative Aquaculture visit at the Nova Harvest hatchery. Sheryl Mass (Bamfield Parks) said an ACRD grant will pay 80% of costs for much needed Information Centre repairs. Community Forest (Stefan Ochman) declared 90% of trees planted last year died. The Community Forest Board will now base all decisions on an ecological-based management plan. Bob Schmitt (Emergency Preparedness): Medical supplies on east side updated by Health Clinic; west side will be inventoried soon. Sheryl Mass gave first presentation for repair of west side public WC's. Meeting adjourned after 2 hrs 7 minutes. Abstracted from Jan Teversham's minutes.

Bamfield Trails, a great recreational asset. Stefan Ochman noted that the Boomer Trail was a 2021 project and not a 2022 as reported in TNB. He then added: "With funding from the BC Rural Dividend Fund, approximately 15 km of trails were flagged and a 1.1 km long Boomer trail, connecting Binnacle and Tower Roads, and 1 km Serenity loop were built in east Bamfield by 2 local workers from September 2020 to April 2021. With funding from Island Coastal Economic Trust, a trail, approximately 2.1 km in length, was built by a contractor from November 2021 to May 2022 through old and second growth forest, connecting the Community Forests in east and west Bamfield." *Invite your away friends to enjoy our local trails*.



Bamfield's Black History. Joya Carson-Austin volunteered to explore Bamfield's Black history for the TNB, using Al-ChartGP, a search/ compose model. Here is the robot's essay: While there is limited information specifically on Black history in Bamfield, there are some broader historical connections to the region. During the late 19th and early 20th centuries, Bamfield was important to development of the telegraph communication in Canada. In 1901, the first transpacific telegraph cable was laid from Bamfield to Fanning Island, opening communication with the rest of the world. One notable Black Canadian who played a significant role in the development of telegraphy in the country was Anderson Ruffin Abbott. Abbott was the first Canadian-born Black person to earn a medical degree, and he was an accomplished telegrapher. In 1861, Abbott was appointed as the first Black telegrapher in Canada. While Abbott's work was not directly connected to Bamfield, his contributions to the development of telegraphy in Canada are an important part of the country's history. ED's note: In a word, Bamfield does not have a Black history, but if you look hard enough, you will find connections.

Bamfield's 36th annual Christmas bird count started on a calm December 17th morning. Twenty-one birders observed more than 3200 birds representing 68 species in the Huu-ay-aht First Nations Hahuuli. The data contributes to the oldest and largest citizen science project in the world. View the worldwide trends here: https://www.audubon.org/conservation/where-have-all-birds-gone. Thank you to the Canadian Coast Guard, Bamfield Marine Science Center, Breakers Marine, Mark Laws and Max Salamon who contributed transportation for the count which would have been impossible without the guidance of Anne Stewart. Bird highlights include a yellow billed loon, a peregrine falcon, three ancient murrelets and an all-time Bamfield high count of 40 rhinoceros auklets. Thank you to Mel Edwards who shared a prayer chant to wish safe travels. Birders (and birds) were thankful the count occurred prior to a chilly end of 2022. Daniel Zayonc

tal unit "...so many premature babies , one

weighing 500 grams born in a bomb shelter." When asked about differences between his two trips, Bob described being swept up in the celebration of the



passing of two soldiers, which is now a weekly event . "The Ukrainians are a wonderful and resilient people." *L. Druehl* . Later Bob added BMSC has agreed to host two high school students on a field trip program. "My organization is covering the travel costs, and SD62 is billeting the students." Photos: top. Departure.
