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A record 52 Zoomers
'participated' in a Moorage Forum, followed by an Affairs Meeting.
Moorage Forum: Four public units and private docks were considered:
West Dock (Transport Canada) needs to be divested or removed. This dock serves the ferry, Coast Guard, and west siders. ACRD, The Lady Rose, and Bamfield Inn

could form a consortium to preserve the dock. HFN Dock, for support of HFN Fisheries has limited capacity to expand. However, there is a potential for 100 slips to be developed at Ostroms. The Fisheries Dock (Bamfield Harbour Authority, Small Craft Harbour/DFO) is intended to support commercial fishers. However Bamfield is considered a non-core harbour, Thus expansion funds are not available or limited if local monies are involved. Divesture is possible with HFN, Not-for Profits and lastly, private. Grappler dock (Bamfield Parks/ACRD) for park users and the general public is supported by park funds. Private docks are under review in the Bamfield Official Plan. Future regulations could dictate extent of private moorage/property. Affairs Meeting: A brief meeting focused on the Regional Director's Report and Bamfield Park's grant-in-aid. Regional Director Bob Beckett, "Working with the ACRD staff we have reduced the proposed [property tax] rate increase [22%] to 17.83%." Bob continued announcing \$700,000 for 2023 projects: Development of the Bamfield Official Community Plan, the creation of a Bamfield Liquid Waste Water Plan, the Bamfield Water System Upgrade, and the Eileen Scott Centennial Park Playground Program. Sheryl Mass gave second reading of the Bamfield Parks' grant-in-aid for repair of the west side, boardwalk outhouse. Meeting adjourned after 2 hours and 58 minutes. Extracted Jan Teversham's minutes. The Lady of the light, Minnie Paterson's 7 December 1906 heroic run from Cape Beale to Bamfied saved the crew of the *Coloma*, shattered on the Cape Beale reef. The telegraph line from the lighthouse to Bamfield was down and only

Minnie was available to fetch help. The tide was in and she had to slog through waist high water to reach the 6 km. trail to Bamfield. After 4 hours she reached the McKay residence and was rowed over to the Cable Station that contacted the Quadra, anchored near by. The Quadra rescued the 10 doomed crew and captain that were dangling from the broken rigging, subjected to



surf. Minnie returned home immediately, that night, as she was nursing her youngest son (on her lap in photo). This episode broke her 'constitution' and she died 5 years later of TB. Extracted from various sources Photos Alberni Valley Museum

## BAMFIELD WEATHER/WARNING

Dry, Dryer, Drying. The last more-than-average monthly rainfall was 2022's May's cold and rainy season. Rainfall for 2022 was about 75 inches; normal precipitation is 106". So, unlike "lucky California", we seem to still be in a dry period. The weather so far for 2023 can be described as coolish and dryer than normal. Last year's cool spring lasted a long time as well. Our 2023 March rain total is 127mm (5"); average March rain is 266mm (10.44"). January rain total was about 228mm (9"); average being 350mm (13.76"). And February's rain total was about 228mm with the average being about 291mm. We've had at least 5 months of dryer-than-average precipitation. Before that, my weather recorder was broken.
