Bob Beckett chaired a meeting in the Rix Centre on 28 August. Advocate attendees introduced their areas of interest. James Willock, Chair Community Affairs outlined community concerns: housing, parking, moorage, sewage, and water supply. Saillard responded with proposed positive positions/actions to the issues and noted the need to support BVFD volunteers, and the expense of an audible wildfire alarm system. Osborne noted fires and floods are more frequent and that a bunker refuge for Bamfielers could be part of the plan. She emphasized, as she has done earlier, the importance of community planning (She noted the Provincial government's move to more efficient land use in zoning). The general meeting adjourned after 2 hours and Osborne, Saillard, Beckett, Willock remained to consider what they had heard. The meeting was productive. The absence of invited frontline advocates for tourism and emergency/fire was offset by information given by others. Minister Osborne has the highest credential possible to assess coastal issues. Her interest in things Bamfield is genuine. She and her assistant MacDonald implied that they would knock on other ministry doors on our behalf. 
